### Attendance campaign on target, but 4th quarter critical

With one grading period left in the school year, CMSD's attendance campaign is on track to achieve its goal of reducing chronic absenteeism by 10 percent.

But the margin is close; that fourth quarter will be critical.

The "Get to School! You Can Make It!" campaign, launched in July, is designed to prevent students from missing 10 or more days in a school year. Students who had missed more than seven days by the end of the third quarter were considered to be at risk of exceeding the threshold.

When the third quarter ended last month, 53.2 percent of District students had missed seven or fewer days. That compares with an average of 47.3 percent at the same point the previous three years. In a district with 38,525 students, the difference is 2,273 more students.

For CMSD to remain on a course to hit the target, more than 52.6 percent had to be on track in attendance at the end of the quarter.

# Chronic absenteeism is a problem facing schools nationwide.

The campaign message is plastered on billboards and yard signs and featured on radio spots. Volunteers have canvassed neighborhoods to talk to families, and they work phones on Thursday nights, calling parents to see if the District can assist with issues that make it difficult for their children to get to school. <image>

The Cleveland Browns have served as a lead partner, with contributions that include having players visit schools and record videos and automated phone calls with a proattendance message.

Radio One is sponsoring a series of surprise "pop-up" parties for schools with outstanding attendance. In the past, nearly two-thirds of CMSD schools reported that more than half of their students missed 10 or more days in a year. District data shows that CMSD students with 10 or more absences are 9 percent less likely to meet Ohio's Third Grade Reading Guarantee, required for promotion to fourth grade. They score an average of 12 points lower on state reading tests and 15 points lower in math; high school students are 34 percent less likely to graduate.

# CMSD grads better prepared for college, report says

Not only are CMSD students graduating in larger numbers, they are more prepared for college and remaining there longer, the Higher Education Compact of Greater Cleveland says in an annual report released March 18.

The report notes, however, that postsecondary enrollment continues to lag at a time when some form of it is needed to land a higher paying job. Compact leaders say cost is a major reason why, so the group is studying community scholarship funds in other cities and trying to establish one in Cleveland.

Launched by Mayor Frank G. Jackson in 2011, the Compact consists of CMSD, the city, 16 colleges and universities and more than 40 organizations interested in serving youths.

Since then, the District graduation rate has climbed from 52 percent to a record 66 percent.

The percentages of students graduating with a B average or higher, scoring a college-ready score of 21 or higher on the ACT admissions exam and participating in advanced-placement courses are at their highest points since the Compact began collecting data. And the percentage needing remediation for math and English in college is at a low. "We're seeing all the right movement in the readiness data," CMSD Chief Executive Officer Eric Gordon told a crowd gathered in the Cleveland State University Student Center ballroom for the report's release. "Our kids can do this."

Richard Bischoff, vice president for enrollment at Case Western Reserve University, agrees that District students are much better prepared. Bischoff, who was in the audience March 18, said he and others at Case have detected a noticeable improvement in recent years as CMSD has carried out The Cleveland Plan, a customized blueprint for education reform in the city.

"That's anecdotal, but we see a difference," he said. "We think we see the impact of the work the District is doing."

According to the report, the percentage of CMSD students going to college within a year of graduating from high school rose from 53 percent to 56 percent in 2014, the most recent year for which data was available. But the increase came after drops the previous two years and remains well short of the Compact's goal of 61 percent to 66 percent by 2017.

The majority of children born into poverty remain at or near the bottom of the income ladder as adults, but their chances of



climbing higher improve dramatically if they complete postsecondary education, said the event's guest speaker, David Dodson.

Dodson is president of MDC, a North Carolina nonprofit that focuses on removing barriers to opportunity. He praised the Higher Education Compact and joked that he planned to copy "80 percent of what I've heard here and take it home."

"The work you are doing is the work of liberation," he said. "It is nothing short of that."
