Curriculum Corner: “Reading as Language”

Speaking, listening, writing, and reading: Language is all around us. We use language to tell people what we need, to ask questions, to watch television, to pay bills, to work with others...the list goes on and on. Reading is just one form of language, the written-down version. Knowing how to use all forms of language well—speaking, listening, reading, and writing—is an important goal for all children. And they need support from both the school and home to be successful with language.

Reading involves thinking and problem solving. It requires us to use knowledge we already have. We must know how to figure out what a word says, and how to put words together to make sense of what is being read. Children will use several strategies for reading within the same sentence. Many familiar words are known by sight. When he reaches a word he does not know, he will probably try to “sound it out” and he will use context clues (how it fits with the

other words) to try to make sense of the text.

For example, a child tries to read “The girl ran to the store.” Child reads: The girl ran to the s-s-s-s-t. Then he tries: The girl ran to the stable. But this doesn’t really make sense in this story, so then he tries: The girl ran to the stare. This still doesn’t make sense so he notices another letter, an “o,” and he’s got it: The girl ran to the store.

Children must learn and use many different things to read: They need vocabulary and word recognition skills; they need to know the relationships between sounds and letters, or phonics skills; and they need ways to see if what they are reading makes sense.

As children are emerging as readers in the toddler and preschool stages, they begin learning about reading by being read to and by their attempts to write. Early writing looks a lot like scribbling but it usually represents some thought the child had. Parents can promote children’s

understandings of text by asking children what they are writing and even writing what they say below their scribbling and then reading it back.

Reading and writing go hand in hand and it’s important to have materials for writing in addition to books in the home.

Helping Your Scholars Get to School

Legally, habitual truancy is now defined in hours, rather than days, and hours add up!. Students are considered habitually truant if they are:

- Absent 30 or more consecutive hours
- Absent 42 or more hours in one school month
- Absent 72 or more hours in one school year

Getting your child to school on-time every day, unless they are sick, is something that you can do to ensure your child has a chance to succeed in school. While others can help, you are the bottom line. You can promote good attendance when you:

- Establish and stick to the basic routines (going to bed early, waking up on time, etc.) that will help your child develop the habit of on-time attendance.
- Talk to your child about why going to school every day is critical and important unless they are sick.
- If your child seems reluctant to go to school, find out why and work with the teacher, administrator or afterschool provider to get them excited about going to school.
- Create backup plans for who to turn to (a family member, a neighbor or fellow parents) to

help you get your child to school if something comes up.

Reach out for help if you are experiencing tough times (e.g. transportation, unstable housing, loss of a job, health problems) that make it difficult to get your child to school. Other parents, your child’s teacher, principal, social worker, school nurse, afterschool providers or community agencies can help you problem-solve or connect you to a needed resource.

If your child is absent, work with the teacher to make sure she or he has an opportunity to learn and make up for the academics missed.

New Programs for Parents and Caregivers

Drama for Mamas and Papas

We are excited to announce a new program sponsored through our lead agency, Cleveland Play House. Drama for Mamas and Papas is a free, bi-monthly program geared towards supporting your scholars and building healthier, stronger families. This program has two main components: a monthly theatre class, and a monthly parent group

On first Tuesdays from 4:00 to 5:00, we will have fun theatre sessions for you and your scholar, led by Cleveland Play House staff.

On third Tuesdays from 4:00 to 5:00, we will have the Parent Power Group, open only to caregivers. These sessions are facilitated by parent and life coach, Morris Ervin.

Parents who complete 25 hours of this program, in combination with volunteer time at school events and activities, will receive a \$75 stipend.

Principals Chat & Chews

Every month, we will host a Principal Chat & Chew, an informal get-together between families and the principal. At these events, we will get to know each other, share information about school events, programs, and strategies, and listen to feedback and questions from parents and caregivers.

We will have our monthly Chat & Chews on Friday mornings following breakfast. Our first Chat & Chew will be on Friday, October 13th at 9:15.

Attendance Incentives and Dress-Down Days

This year, one of our school goals is to raise our daily attendance to 92.5%. In the past few weeks, we have reached and even surpassed this goal through the combined efforts of families and staff.

This year, there are a number of incentives students can earn through high attendance:

- When students have perfect attendance and no behavior referrals for a 5-day week of school, they will receive a dress-down pass. **Student need to present this pass in order to dress down for the day.**
- Students can also “purchase” a dress down pass from the Gator Store. Students earn Gator Bucks throughout the week for showing positive behavior in class. Gator Bucks can be redeemed for small toys or dress down passes.
- Every day students attend school, they receive a raffle ticket for a chance to win a large prize at the end of each month. The raffle prize for September is a bicycle.
