Say Yes Cleveland provides tuition scholarships to college or career training to all CMSD students who enroll in CMSD from 9th-12 grade and reside within *CMSD district boundaries for all of high school. Parent Ambassador Program

Part-time Parent Ambassadors will be in every school this year to support family/school partnerships. Hours are flexible.

- Must be a parent or legal guardian of student enrolled in the school
- Role:
 - Parent Ambassadors provides parents and guardians with the opportunity to develop leadership and advocacy skills while supporting family engagement and the academic success of students.
 - Supports development of resource rooms and family engagement programs and activities with school staff.





What is the purpose of Title IA - ESSA?

(ESSA – Every Student Succeeds Act) Family Engagement Federal Funding

To inform parents/caregivers of their rights and roles within their scholar's school building as it relates to:

- Being included in decision making opportunities and committees regarding school improvement plans
- Participating in school-based parent organizations (SPO/PAC/PCO, etc.)
- Providing input on how Title IA Family Engagement funds are spent to support meaningful engagement activities which advance student achievement
- Ensuring that the school engages in two-way communication with parents to strengthen family/school partnerships
- Removing barriers to participation (time of day, child-care, translation services, accommodations for special needs, transportation, etc.)

Parents' Right to Know -Title IA - ESSA

Parents have the right to know about the teaching qualifications of their child's classroom teacher in a school receiving Title I funds. You can request this information from your principal.

- Notification if your child is being taught for 4 or more weeks by a teacher who is not highly qualified.
- Whether the teacher has met state qualification and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction
- Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which State qualification or licensing criteria have been waived
- Whether the teacher is teaching in the field of discipline of certification of the teacher
- Whether your child is provided services by paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications



How can I support Title IA Programs?

- Participate in the SPO (School Parent Organization) or Parent Advisory Committee
- Ask to participate in the development of the Academic Achievement Plan (AAP)
- Attend Title IA sponsored programs and activities
- Support your child's learning by creating a learning space for them to do schoolwork and exposing them to resources and enrichment opportunities in the community
- Participate in family engagement activities and programs sponsored by the district like Parent University workshops and offerings

Student Attendance

Attending class every day on time and all day improves academic success!

- GOOD ATTENDANCE means missing less than 10 days of school in a year:
 - Increases a student's reading score by 12 points
 - Increases a student's math score by 15 points
 - Increases a student's chance to remain on track to graduation by 34%





Student Attendance

- Ask your child what he or she is learning every day and if they feel safe in school. If your child is having negative experiences, call or visit your school to address the issues with educators.
- Monitor your child's academic progress and seek help from educators or tutors if necessary.
- Make sure your contact information is up-to-date with your school.
- Talk with your child about the importance of getting to school every day and make it the expectation.
- Help your child maintain daily routines.





COVID-19 PROCEDURES

- Call 216-838-WELL (9355) to report positive test or if you have any questions.
- Email: covid@clevelandmetroschools.org can be used to report cases. We are following the Mask to Stay protocol from ODH.
- If you (or a student) are exposed to Covid: You may come to school, but you must mask for 10 days after exposure.
- If symptoms develop, stay home and get tested.
- If you are exposed to Covid in school, you will be asked to mask for 10 days after exposure.
- Vaccines are still the best way to protect yourself and your family. Vaccines for children and adults ages 6 months and up are available through the Cleveland Dept of Health 216-644-2222.





Testing and Assessments

Tests seek to see what students have learned. At the school level, educators create tests to measure their students' understanding of specific content or the effective application of critical thinking skills. Such tests are used to evaluate student learning, skill level growth and academic achievements at the end of an instructional period, such as the end of a project, unit, course, semester, program or school year.

Third Grade Reading Guarantee

Ohio's Third Grade Reading Guarantee identifies students from kindergarten through grade 3 that are behind in reading. Schools will provide help and support to make sure students are on track for reading success by the end of third grade. Ohio's Third Grade Guarantee ensures that every struggling reader gets the support he or she needs to be able to learn and achieve. Although Ohio has made temporary changes to the criteria for passing grade 3, students who are not on track in reading (grades K-3) will be required to receive interventions and track progress through the Reading Improvement and Monitoring Plans.

Parents are encouraged to talk about these strategies with their child's teacher.

Planning and Career Exploration

PACE is an embedded curriculum for 6th – 12th graders that provides them with knowledge, skills, experiences, and confidence to uncover the occupations or careers they want to pursue. PACE uses variety of quality in-school curriculum and out-of-school lessons and experiences that facilitate exploration.

Each graduate should have a student-centered career pathway that reflect student-made choices.

- Experiences in PACE- ask students "What is your career goal or vision?
- Ensuring that every CMSD graduate has a student-centered career pathway that reflect student-made choices.
- Acknowledges each scholar is different and sets all individuals up for success.
- Provides scholars support and advising to explore their passions and dreams.
- Encourages scholars to actively make decisions and plan a career pathway that helps them achieve their goals.
- Calls upon the community and industry to open their doors to allow for exploration of many occupations and career possibilities.





True2U is a volunteer youth
development and career awareness mentoring
program under PACE (Planning and Career Exploration)

graders explore their true selves and prepare to make
the most of high school as the first step on the path to
college and career readiness.





True2U Program Activities and Events

Program Launch in October

True2U kicks off in a fun way with an introduction to careers and an inspirational speaker to get students excited about their upcoming True2U journey.

In-School Advisory Sessions October-May

Students are led by a team of two or three mentors (supported by a CMSD teacher) at their school for two hours, in the morning each month, completing a formal curriculum on personal development and career awareness.

Out-of-School Experience March – May (TBD by schools)

Out of school experiences take students out of the classroom for behind-the-scenes tours of local workplaces to see first-hand the kinds of careers available to them in our local economy. Students also tour a college campus to learn more about their options after high school.

Culminating Event in May

The program year ends with all 2,500 8th graders coming together with their mentors to reflect on their experiences in the program and to focus on making a smooth transition to high school.

Summer Program: True2U Student Advisory Committee

Through an interview process students are selected to sit on the True2U Student Advisory Committee to evaluate, revise, and update the True2U curriculum while they continue to develop their leadership skills. Students are paid for their participation through Y.O.U.

Special Education

- Special education and related services are offered at every school.
- Students with disabilities are included with their grade level peers in all educational programming, unless their IEP calls for a separate setting for part or all of the day because of the nature or severity of the disability.
- If you suspect your child may have a disability that is affecting their education, please communicate this to your child's teacher or school Principal (preferably in writing). The School Psychologist and Student Support Team (SST) will convene a meeting with you within 30 days to discuss your concerns and respond.

Project Act – Homeless Services

- Project ACT provides direct instructional and support services to children and youth residing in temporary emergency shelters, transitional housing and doubled-up students staying with other families due to loss of housing, economic hardship or similar situations.
- A holistic and comprehensive approach is used to deliver instructional and support services necessary to facilitate the homeless child's transition into school, and to ensure the child's success and ongoing participation in the educational system.
- Support services include everything necessary to accomplish the goal of meeting students' physical, social and emotional needs, and empowering parents to support their children in this endeavor. All appropriate resources from the Cleveland Metropolitan School District are employed to achieve this goal.






Multilingual Multicultural Education Department

- Multilingual Multicultural Education Department is tasked in making sure that all CMSD's
 English Learners receive the appropriate language learning services alongside continuing grade
 level content learning and teaching. Academic English language learning focuses on developing
 literacy and proficiency listening, speaking, reading and writing.
- The Multilingual Department is also in charge of developing and implementing all of the World Language offerings in all CMSD high schools and select PK-8 Schools. This component also works with schools in ensuring students qualify for the Ohio Seal of Biliteracy at the time of high school graduation.
- The Multilingual Multicultural Education Department not only ensures the education of all English learners in CMSD, but also:
 - Provides enrollment and language assessments for students whose first language is not English;
 - Family and student support services in several languages;
 - Translation and interpretation services;
 - Assists with home and school connections, and facilitates communication and school options/choices;
 - Helps with families and students in crisis.








Universal School-Based Health Consent Form: Why

- CMSD and Say Yes to Education are partnering with 17 community agencies to provide access to health services at ALL CMSD schools.
- Each school's goal is to get signed forms on file for as many scholars as possible.
- When the form is on file, any of the health providers on the form can share information about a student's health needs and initiate treatment. This reduces the delay in getting an appointment when there is a need.







Universal Health Consent Form – More Details

- Completion of this consent form is required for your child to receive these health services from CMSD partner health providers
- When you sign the Universal Health Consent Form, you give permission for the District to share the form with its partners, to give them permission to deliver any of the services that are NOT crossed out/denied on the form.
- You only need to sign the form ONCE.
- Signing the form does NOT impact any of your child's outside health services or your Medicaid status.

Your School Nurse will reach out to you to support you in completing the form.
