Part-time Parent Ambassadors will be in every school this year to support family/school partnerships. Hours are flexible.

- Must be a parent or legal guardian of student enrolled in the school
- Provides parents and guardians with the opportunity to develop leadership and advocacy skills while supporting family engagement and the academic success of students
- Supports development of resource rooms and family engagement programs and activities with school staff



**Planning and Career Exploration** 

CMSD will be implementing PACE, a 6-12+ grade planning and career exploration program designed to link CMSD students to living wage careers after graduation.

With the support of businesses and community partners this program will help shift the focus form college or career to all students need a career and often student need college or post-high school training to achieve this

### Student Attendance

Attending class every day on time improves academic success!

- GOOD ATTENDANCE means missing less than 10 days of school in a year:
  - Increases a student's reading score by 12 points
  - Increases a student's math score by 15 points
  - Increases a student's chance to remain on track to graduation by 34%



### Student Attendance

- Ask your child if he or she is learning every day and if they feel safe in school. If your child is having negative experiences, call or visit your school to address the issues with educators.
- Monitor your child's academic progress and seek help from educators or tutors if necessary.
- Make sure your contact information is up-to-date with your school.
- Talk with your child about the importance of getting to school every day and make it the expectation.
- Help your child maintain daily routines. (Contest Brown's Tickets)



### **COVID-19 Procedures**

### **COVID-19 Vaccination Clinics and Testing**

- Vaccine clinics will be offered at various school sites across the city. For information on locations call the Cleveland Department of Public Health, 216.644.2222.
- Students who receive the vaccine have a chance to win Prosports tickets, bikes, Walmart gift cards, Visa gift cards and/or Cavs swag which will be distributed at their second dose appointment.
- Covid-19 testing will take place in all buildings this academic year.
- Testing is available for staff and students and will be offered in district administrative buildings.

### **Testing and Assessments**

Tests seek to see what students have learned. At the school level, educators create tests to measure their students' understanding of specific content or the effective application of critical thinking skills. Such tests are used to evaluate student learning, skill level growth and academic achievements at the end of an instructional period, such as the end of a project, unit, course, semester, program or school year.

### Third Grade Reading Guarantee

Ohio's Third Grade Reading Guarantee identifies students from kindergarten through grade 3 that are behind in reading. Schools will provide help and support to make sure students are on track for reading success by the end of third grade. Ohio's Third Grade Guarantee ensures that every struggling reader gets the support he or she needs to be able to learn and achieve. Although Ohio has made temporary changes to the criteria for passing grade 3, students who are not on track in reading (grades K-3) will be required to receive interventions and track progress through the Reading Improvement and Monitoring Plans.

Parents are encouraged to talk about these strategies with their child's teacher.



<u>True2U</u> is an **innovative** year-long youth development and career exploration **mentoring** program that prepares all Cleveland Metropolitan School District (CMSD) **eighth grade** students for the **transition** from middle school to high school.





### True2U Program Activities and Events

- Program Launch in September
- In-School Advisory Sessions October-April
  - Groups of 10-15 students are led by a team of two or three mentors (supported by a CMSD teacher) at their school, for two hours each month completing a formal curriculum on personal development and career awareness.
- Out-of-School Experience March May (TBD by schools)
  - Day-long Trip: Students visit a Northeast Ohio organization for a tour and career awareness program in the morning and tour a college or university in the afternoon.
- Culminating Event in May
  - Recording Artist and Motivational Speaker Dee-1, High School Readiness Workshops and a Student Summer Opportunity Fair with community partners and organizations.
- Summer Program: True2U Student Advisory Committee
  - Through an interview process students are selected to sit on the True2U Student Advisory Committee to evaluate, revise, and update the True2U curriculum while they continue to develop their leadership skills. Students are paid for their participation through Y.O.U.

### Special Education

- Special Education is a continuum of services and supports designed for children who have disabilities that impact their academic performance.
- While the District is in Remote Learning, all special education services will be delivered remotely and through teletherapy services. The services in your child's IEP will be implemented through virtual/remote means.
  - In-person services will resume once it is safe to do so.
  - You can request an IEP meeting at any time to discuss your child's remote services.
- IEP and ETR meetings will be held virtually or via telephone. If neither of these methods works for you, please speak with your child's Intervention Specialist.
- If you suspect your child may have a disability, please communicate this to your child's teacher or school Principal (preferably in writing).
  - The School Psychologist and Student Support Team (SST) will convene a meeting with you within 30 days to discuss your concerns and respond.

### Project Act – Homeless Services

- Project ACT provides direct instructional and support services to children and youth residing in temporary emergency shelters, transitional housing and doubled-up students staying with other families due to loss of housing, economic hardship or similar situations.
- A holistic and comprehensive approach is used to deliver instructional and support services necessary to facilitate the homeless child's transition into school, and to ensure the child's success and ongoing participation in the educational system.
- Support services include everything necessary to accomplish the goal of meeting students'
  physical, social and emotional needs, and empowering parents to support their children in
  this endeavor. All appropriate resources from the Cleveland Metropolitan School District
  are employed to achieve this goal.

- Multilingual Multicultural Education Department is tasked in making sure that all CMSD's English Learners receive the appropriate language learning services alongside continuing grade level content learning and teaching. Academic English language learning focuses on developing literacy and proficiency listening, speaking, reading and writing.
- The Multilingual Multicultural Education Department not only ensures the education of all English learners in CMSD, but also:
  - Provides enrollment and language assessments for students whose first language is not English;
  - Family and student support services in several languages;
  - Translation and interpretation services;
  - Assists with home and school connections, and facilitates communication and school options/choices;
  - Helps with families and students in crisis.

### What is the purpose of Title IA - ESSA?

(ESSA – Every Student Succeeds Act ) Family Engagement Federal Funding

To inform parents/caregivers of their rights and roles within their scholar's school building as it relates to:

- Being included in decision making opportunities and committees regarding school improvement plans
- Participating in school-based parent organizations (SPO/PAC/PCO, etc.)
- Providing input on how Title IA Family Engagement funds are spent to support meaningful engagement activities which advance student achievement
- Ensuring that the school engages in two-way communication with parents to strengthen family/school partnerships
- Removing barriers to participation (time of day, child-care, translation services, accommodations for special needs, transportation, etc.)

### Parents' Right to Know -Title IA - ESSA

Parents have the right to know about the teaching qualifications of their child's classroom teacher in a school receiving Title I funds. You can request this information from your principal.

- Notification if your child is being taught for 4 or more weeks by a teacher who is not highly qualified.
- Whether the teacher has met state qualification and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction
- Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which State qualification or licensing criteria have been waived
- Whether the teacher is teaching in the field of discipline of certification of the teacher
- Whether your child is provided services by paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications



### How can I support Title IA Programs?

- Participate in the SPO (School Parent Organization) or Parent Advisory Committee
- Ask to participate in the development of the Academic Achievement Plan (AAP)
- Attend Title IA sponsored programs and activities
- Support your child's learning by creating a learning space for them to do schoolwork and exposing them to resources and enrichment opportunities in the community
- Participate in family engagement activities and programs sponsored by the district like Parent University workshops and offerings
