Mergers



Merge Collinwood and Glenville; build a new high school in the Northeast



Overview of School Action

Merging Collinwood and Glenville into a newly built HS will benefit both schools through a higherquality student experience, including additional career pathways and college credit courses

Collinwood and Glenville

- Enrollment at Collinwood and Glenville is unsustainably low and declining; merging the schools will provide expanded courses, pathways, and extracurriculars
- Both Collinwood and Glenville buildings are in unsatisfactory condition; resources will be better spent building a new school

New East Side HS

- A <u>new high school</u> is in design and scheduled to open in 2031, welcoming students from both Glenville and Collinwood and allowing us to maximize our capital resources, including leveraging matching funds available from the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission
- Collinwood students will move to Glenville while the new school is built
- Every student will have access to expanded career pathways, college credit courses, and electives, and the ability to pursue an honors diploma
- Allied health, including nursing and dental, will continue to be areas of specialization that students can choose immediately, and the new high school will provide a home for trades on the East Side
- For Collinwood students, merging with Glenville will mean immediate opportunities to compete in expanded Senate League sports



*All students with transportation-related accommodations on their IEP will continue to receive transportation, regardless of where they live.

Looking Ahead

Transitioning school

Collinwood students in grades 9-11 have a reserved seat at Glenville while a new school is built and first priority for *available seats* at all other schools during the School Choice Process.

Welcoming school

Students in grades 9-11 at Glenville do not need to participate in School Choice to remain at their current school.

The Glenville building will host students from both Collinwood and Glenville while a new building is under construction.

All students will continue to be supported in their goal of graduating ready for college and career.

Special education single classrooms will still be offered at multiple schools. Families whose children are in these specialized classrooms will get additional outreach and support to enroll.

Pathway completion options will be shared with students to help inform their graduation planning.



School choice

Families can use the CMSD School Finder and School Choice Book to better understand their options.

School Choice will launch in January and run through the end of February.



Leadership

Principals for the 2026-27 school year will be appointed in December.



Staff

Staff assignments will be confirmed in Spring 2026, following the School Choice process.

School staff teams will be merged in alignment with our contractual obligations, enrollment, and the needs of the merged student community.



School community

Students, families, and staff will have opportunities to connect and collaborate around the future of the unified school community over the course of the spring and summer before the start of the 2026-27 school year.
