Overview of School Action



Merging Euclid Park with East Clark will benefit both schools through a higherquality student experience, including additional courses beyond art, music, and PE – along with expanded sports

Euclid Park

- Euclid Park's enrollment is unsustainably low and declining in a small building, limiting the school's ability to offer a robust student experience
- There are available seats in the region that are in good condition buildings and will allow for a higher-quality student experience
- Specifically, students will have a reserved seat at East Clark, a school with a comparable star rating (both 2.5 stars) housed in a good condition building

East Clark

- East Clark is in a good condition building with a need for greater enrollment to sustainably offer more opportunities for students
- East Clark will continue to serve students in its current location, welcoming students from Euclid Park



Transportation*

Current Euclid Park students who accept this reserved seat and reside within 3 miles of Euclid Park and more than a mile from East Clark are eligible for transportation to East Clark for SY 26-27 and SY 27-28.



If you would like to explore other options, students currently at Euclid Park will also receive first priority for available seats at all schools they are eligible to attend during the School Choice application process, which launches in January.

^{*}All students with transportation-related accommodations on their IEP will continue to receive transportation, regardless of where they live.

Looking Ahead



Transitioning school

Euclid Park students in grades K-7 have a reserved seat at East Clark and first priority for *available seats* at all other schools during the School Choice Process.

Welcoming school

East Clark students in grades K-7 do not need to participate in School Choice to remain at their current school.

All current 8th graders across CMSD will continue to be supported in making a high school choice.

Special education single classrooms will still be offered at multiple schools in every region. Families whose children are in these specialized classrooms will get additional outreach and support to enroll.



School choice

Families can use the CMSD School Finder and School Choice Book to better understand their options starting in December.

School Choice will launch in January and run through the end of February.



Leadership

Principals for the 2026-27 school year will be appointed in December.



Staff

Staff assignments will be confirmed in Spring 2026, following the School Choice process.

School staff teams will be merged in alignment with our contractual obligations, enrollment, and the needs of the merged student community.



School community

Students, families, and staff will have opportunities to connect and collaborate around the future of the unified school community over the course of the spring and summer before the start of the 2026-27 school year.
