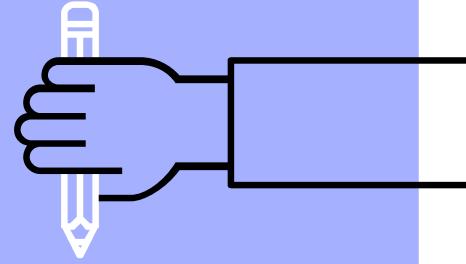




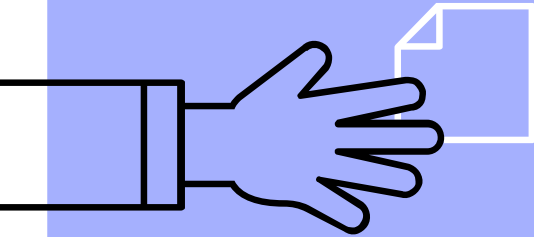
# Mastery Learning

# The Big Five

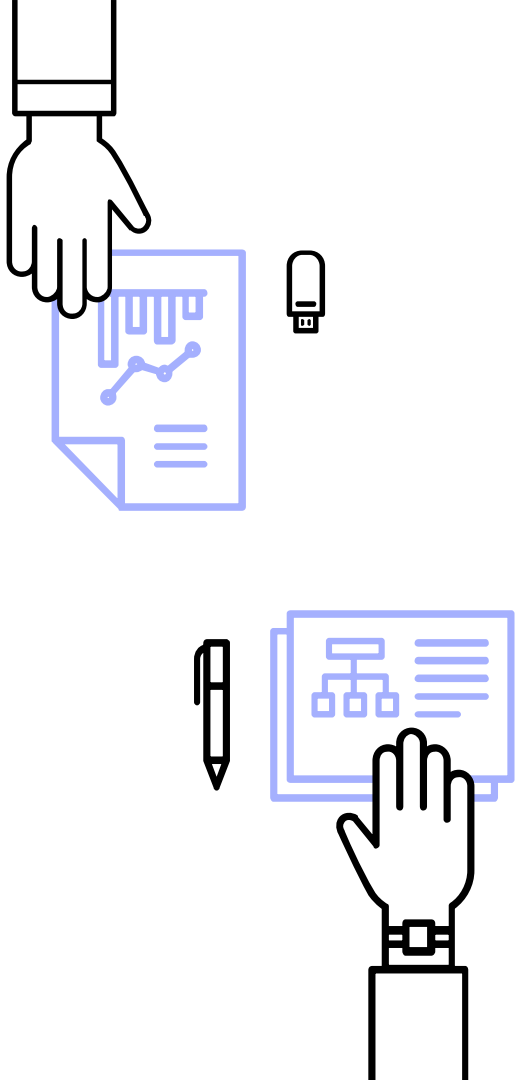
- Technology and Sciences
- English/Literature
- Humanities and Social Skills
- Mathematics
- The Arts

Each course a person takes will descend from one of these five categories



# Course Examples

- Technology and Sciences- Home Economics
- English/Literature- Film Study
- Humanities and Social Skills- Common Etiquette, Time Management
- Mathematics- Finance,
- The Arts- Visual Art, Music, etc.



# Community Involvement

- Designed for interaction with community members
- Schools partner with organizations to learn complex skills in their courses
- Allows students to work in groups



# Mini Electives and Mentoring

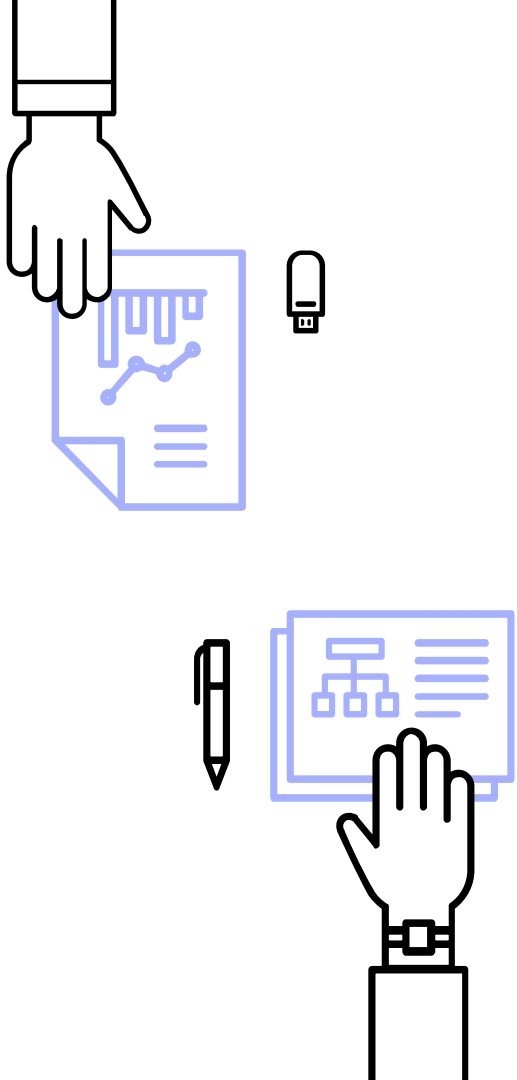
- Mini Electives: smaller classes that allow students to pursue passions (3 week long intensives)
- Mentoring: students meet with a mentor to discuss courses, grades, and strengths found during class time





# Year Schedule

- 5 Units in the school year ( Units 1-5)
- 7 weeks in each Unit
- 175 days in the year

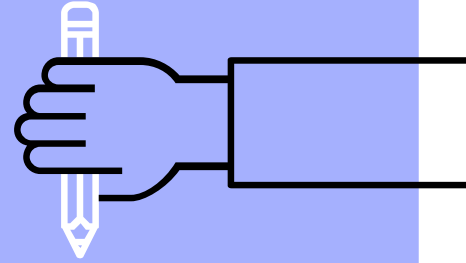
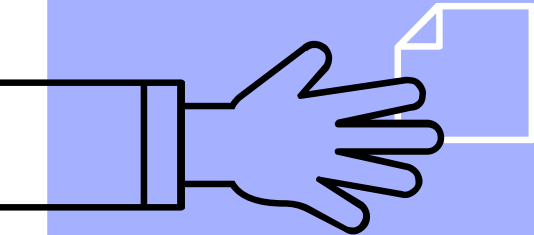


# Student Schedule

- Each student will take at least one course from each of the Big Five per unit

## 2. GRADING SCALE



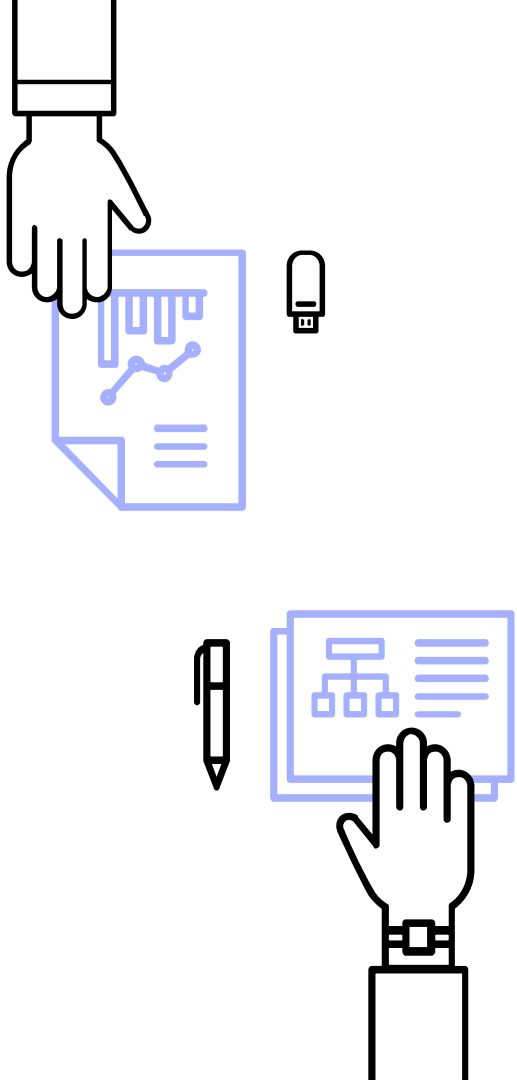
# Grading System

- 3.6-4.0: Exceeds Mastery; receive an “E”
- 3.0-3.5: Mastery; receive an “M”
- 2.0-2.9: Partial Mastery; receive a “P”
- 1.0-1.9: Insufficient Evidence; receive an “I”

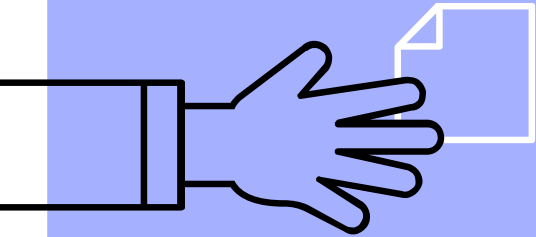
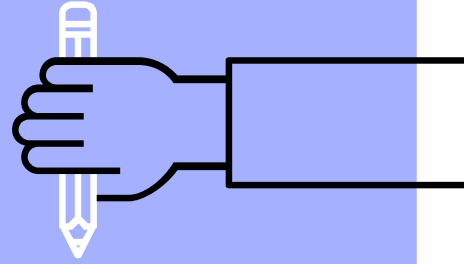


# Assignments
