




Northeast, East and Southeast Regions: High School Metric Highlights

Academic Quality



- 34% of high school enrollment across the regions on the east side is in A, B or C-rated schools.
- 100% of District A and B-rated high schools have admissions criteria.





- Combined, District and charter high school enrollment is forecast to decline 130 students, or 2%, by 2022-23. This follows a 10% enrollment decline since 2013.
- 58% of high school students residing on the east side attend District schools over other options.



None of the 23 east side District high schools are above the desired viability target of 500 and only three are above the minimum enrollment target of 400 students.



- 47% of District high school seats are utilized with roughly 7,000 vacant high school seats in the area, which is five times greater than the amount of open seats on the west side.
- Approximately 46% of students attending District high schools are served in buildings that are newly built since 2002.





2017-18 District and Charter School Locations by 2018 ODE Overall Report Card Grades




Higher performing schools are primarily admissions-criteria based and mostly in the University neighborhood.

Historical and Forecast Enrollment of High School Students Residing on the East Side Attending a School Anywhere in the City




- When combining students across sectors, high school enrollment declined 10% from 2013 to 2017
- The east side high school population is forecast to decline 130 students, or 2%, by 2022 with the decline split between District and charter schools.



East Side High Schools: How are east side students choosing among their available school options?


2017-18 Enrollment by School Type and Location for East Side Residents



- 58% of east side high school students attend District schools over other options, in-line with 57% of west side high school students attending District schools.
- Of students attending District schools, 89% of east side residents stay east, which is in line with attendance patterns on the west side of Cleveland.

East Side High Schools: What percentage of District high schools meet minimum enrollment targets?


District High School Programs on East Side with 2017-18 Enrollment Above 400 Students



- District high schools with at least 400 students are more likely to have the resources to sustain the baseline desired learning and teaching experience. This minimum enrollment target is the equivalent of 100 students per grade level from 9th to 12th grade.
- Ideally, District high schools would enroll closer to 500 students, or 125 students per grade level, allowing for funding necessary for a more vibrant and viable school program.
- Only 13%, or three of the 23 District high school programs in these regions are above the minimum viability target of 400 students and none are above the desired enrollment target of 500 students.



- The phase-in and phase-out of numerous east side programs is creating large enrollment changes between years.

2017-18 District High School Building Utilization by Building Age




- 47% of District high school seats are in use, leaving approximately 7,000 empty seats in these regions. 65% of seats in new or renovated buildings are in use, while 38% of seats in buildings constructed prior to 2002 are in use.
- Approximately 46% of students attending District high schools are served in buildings that are newly built or renovated since 2002. Eleven of the 23 District high school programs are operating in buildings newly built or renovated since 2002.


