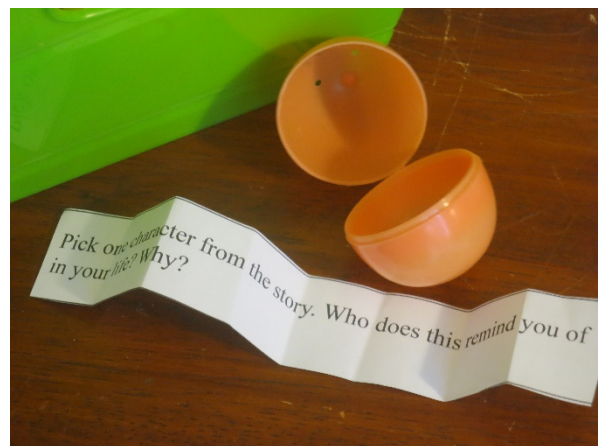
Included in this pack are 8 discussion questions for both **fiction** and **nonfiction texts**. These questions are general enough that they will work with almost any fiction or nonfiction text.
